HATS OFF

- Students **Devon Hemsley, Alexis Marans, Egbert Simon, Tri Dung Tran** and **Kimberly Trout** enrolled in Assistant Professor of Chemistry Jeffrey Ashley's *Instrumental Methods of Analysis* class recently won the second place award of \$100 in this year's poster competition at the 22nd annual meeting of the Society for Environmental Toxicology and Chemistry (SETAC) at West Chester University. Their poster, *Can Lifestyle Influence Mercury Levels?*, is permanently displayed in a glass case on the second floor of Hayward Hall. The Academy of Natural Sciences, Assistant Professor of Psychology Adam Cohen and other contributing faculty members also played instrumental roles in the success of the poster.
- On April 12, **Scott Ogburn**, adjunct professor, School of Architecture, addressed the Easton City Council on the \$500,000 Lenape Nation Monument that's to be constructed along the Delaware River in Easton, Pa. During his presentation, Prof. Ogburn discussed the monument's sacred architectural alignment with the summer-solstice sunrise. As the project's principal fountain designer and a member of the Lenape Nation Monument Project Council, Prof. Ogburn will assist in the national fundraising for its construction. Once completed, the monument will stand as the largest Native American memorial of its kind on the East Coast.
